Fairway Topdressing

Topdressing is simply the application of a thin layer of sand across the fairways. While the process might appear simple, the agronomic benefits are significant and long-lasting. Over time, repeated applications of sand create a more ideal growing environment for turfgrass and enhance the overall performance of the golf course.

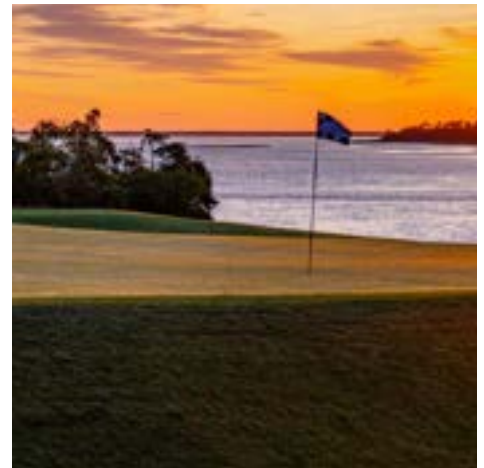
Here are the primary benefits:

- **Organic Matter Improvement.** Turf naturally produces organic material (thatch and decomposed leaf tissue) as it grows. If left unmanaged, this layer accumulates and retains excess moisture, leading to soft, spongy surfaces and a higher risk of turf disease. Incorporating sand through topdressing physically dilutes this organic matter, ensuring firmer, more stable fairways.
- **Improved Soil Structure & Drainage.** Introducing sand improves porosity and infiltration, allowing surface water to move through the profile more efficiently. This translates into drier playing conditions after rain events and less surface sealing from compaction.
- **Enhanced Surface Smoothness.** Sand fills small depressions and minor imperfections, gradually evening the surface and improving our fairway mowing quality of cut. This also improves disease resistance and ball roll.
- **Root Development & Turf Health.** By promoting a more oxygen-rich and less compact soil profile, sand allows for deeper, healthier rooting. Stronger roots allow turf to better tolerate drought, traffic, and summer stress, ultimately reducing inputs like irrigation and plant protectants.
- **Sustainability.** Sand topdressing enhances sustainability by improving soil health, increasing water infiltration, and boosting turf resilience against pests and diseases, leading to lower pesticide usage over time. Overall, topdressing contributes to a healthier ecosystem while improving the course's aesthetics and playability.

Topdressing is not a one-time fix but an ongoing program that builds cumulative benefits season after season. It is one of the most important practices we implement to sustain the level of firmness and playability that makes Eastward Ho! unique.

Please remember to rake your bunkers, fix your ballmarks, and replace your divots as a courtesy to the groups behind you! Thank you!





Greens Department MASTER PLAN

At Eastward Ho!, we remain committed to refining the golf course in ways that respect its natural character while enhancing the overall member experience. A key part of that process is listening carefully to member feedback and collaborating closely with Kyle Franz to guide future improvements.

In recent months, this collaboration has resulted in the creation of several new walking trails to improve accessibility and course flow. These paths not only make walking the course more enjoyable but also help protect sensitive turf areas from concentrated wear. These areas include: Fox Hill road to 2 gold/white tee, 12 green to 13 white/green tee, 15 green and 17 green to 18 tee.

Equally important to our ongoing efforts is the establishment of Native grasses and plants in areas surrounding tees and in and around Native Sandy Areas. These young Native areas are fundamental to

preserving the Club's coastal landscape and supporting ecological diversity. However, they require time, patience, and care to fully mature. Members are encouraged to drive carts and walk carefully near these plantings, allowing them to take root and develop into the naturalized, healthy stands envisioned for the course.

In addition, we continue to work with the Conservation Commission by planting new native species and mitigating invasive plants, such as Japanese knotweed, throughout the property. These efforts are essential to maintaining the natural beauty and environmental integrity that make Eastward Ho! so distinctive.

Thank you for your continued patience, care, and engagement as we work together to enhance both the playability and ecological health of this extraordinary property.

FROM THE PRO SHOP

A good article that I'd like to share in the fall season:

The "Leaf" Rule:

Yes, the "leaf rule" is actually a real thing. Here is what the rules say about it:

If you play golf in northern climates, you have undoubtedly heard about the "leaf rule." Some use it as a cheerful concession to allow their partner a free drop when they cannot find their ball just off the fairway. Others invoke it as a serious justification for taking free relief, passionately claiming the Rules of Golf support their move.

The question is; "is it an official rule?" Well, kind of, and it takes some explaining.

In everyday use (irrespective of what the official rules dictate), when golfers lose a ball that clearly came to rest in a pile of leaves, they often take a free drop rather than incurring a penalty and replaying the previous shot. On the surface, this "leaf rule" makes logical sense. Why should a golfer who can't find their ball in a dense pile of leaves just off the fairway receive the same penalty as one who just sliced one out-of-bounds?

Yet, the Rules of Golf are not so lenient. Under Rule 18.2, "Your ball is lost if not found in three minutes after you or your caddie begin to search for it." According to the same rule, when a ball is lost, you must take stroke-and-distance relief (adding one penalty stroke) and play from the spot of your previous shot.

So where is this "leaf rule?" Proponents of the free drop may (incorrectly) cite Rule 16.1, which allows a player to take free relief from a ball not found when it is "known or virtually certain" that it came to rest in or on an "abnormal course condition." That doesn't solve the issue, though, as abnormal course conditions are defined as "animal holes, ground under repair, immovable obstructions or temporary water." Notably omitted: leaves.

In fact, the leaf rule cannot be found in one of the 24 Rules of Golf. Instead, it's part of the "Model Local Rules" that a tournament committee or course staff can choose to implement on a given hole(s) and given day. Here, under Model Local Rule F-14, we find the leaf rule:

"At certain times of the year, piles of loose impediments such as leaves, seeds or acorns may make it difficult for a player to find or play his or her ball. A Committee can choose to treat such piles of loose impediments in the general area or in a bunker as ground under repair from which free relief is allowed under Rule 16.1."



A Gift from Royal North Devon Golf Club

This summer you may have noticed a framed Eastward Ho! flag mounted over the bar in The Fowler Room. That flag proudly flew at our "sister course" in England — Royal North Devon Golf Club affectionately known as Westward Ho! — during their 150th anniversary celebration.

Westward Ho! was originally laid out by Old Tom Morris but revised in 1908 by "our very own" architect W. Herbert Fowler who was also a member of RNDGC. That Eastward Ho! flag now has a companion from Westward Ho!. This new flag is a gift from the members of RNDGC to celebrate the re-opening of our golf course. It flew from our flagpole during the 4th of July and now takes its place of honor in the room named after the architect of both courses.

Special thanks to Brendon Eberhardt for this excellent idea and to Sally and Jack Bohman for their hard work curating, refurbishing, and reorganizing the Club's art collection and golf memorabilia. If you have not already, then be sure to look on the walls of the Grille Room at some of the artifacts that the Bohmans have so carefully and thoughtfully presented.

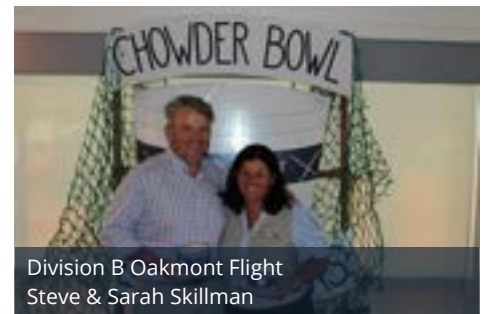

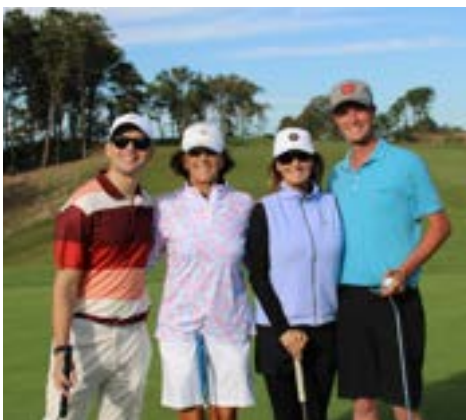
